


SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

January 19, 2025



The wedding at Cana captures the essence of Jesus' earthly ministry through stark dialogue and vivid imagery that foreshadow the hour of the glory of God. The framework is covenant, the nature of which manifests through believing in the word of Jesus and the revelation of God. The covenantal archetype is presented through relationship between Jesus and his mother. As woman and mother, she further characterizes both this covenant and the vocation of believers once the hour arrives them by integrating others.

As his ministry progresses, Jesus upholds the women as a model. Further, when he approaches and interacts with those he calls "woman," the covenant with this first woman is recalled. When Jesus says to the Samaritan at the well, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming" (Jn 20:15), to Mary Magdala at the empty tomb, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" (Jn 20:15), we are reminded of the response of the woman who first believed without seeing signs or wonders, who believed foremost in the word of Jesus. Paul articulates this faithful courage as a gift of the Holy Spirit.



It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us
